"Sec. 2. Said corporation may take, hold, transmit, and convey real and personal estate to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars."

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

Newport, Rhode Island, shall hereafter have power to mortgage its real estate, and any interest in real estate, for the securing of the lawful indebtedness of said corporation, and to embody in its mortgages such powers of sale, and all such other powers, provisos, and clauses, as are or shall be customary in mortgages approved or taken by savings banks or trust companies in this state Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
